Dear Coastal Dungeness Crab Fishery Participant:

The purpose of this letter is to provide you with information regarding changes to regulations pertaining to the Coastal Dungeness crab fishery.

Substitute House Bill 2250 (SHB 2250) was passed by the Washington State Legislature during their 2020 session and has been signed by Governor Inslee. Changes made through this legislation support efforts to reduce the risk of coastal Dungeness crab gear becoming derelict and entangling marine mammals, including Humpback whales which are listed under the federal Endangered Species Act. The legislation, in combination with recent regulatory changes adopted by the Fish and Wildlife Commission, including a reduced pot limit and summer buoy tags, will allow WDFW to expand the derelict gear recovery program to authorize gear recovery earlier in the year and prior to the close of the regular season. This proactive measure will allow crab fishers to recover gear that is not properly marked with a summer buoy tag, thereby reducing derelict gear and decreasing the potential for whale entanglements.

WDFW staff is in the process of implementing the provisions of SHB 2250 into state regulation. Due to the effective date of the legislation and the timing of the permanent rule making, derelict gear recovery will be allowed in early August this year. Specific details on participation will be included in a follow-up letter. In subsequent years, gear recovery can be considered as early as May 1. Permit requirements will be the same as the original program and will include the reporting and registration of all gear recovered. The permit provisions will allow for the continued protection of license holders from legitimate gear theft while still allowing for gear recovery.
